Mechanical Engineering

1. Stages of the procedure

To be admitted to the programme, you must:

- a. **Pay** the fee of €10.00 in accordance with the procedures and deadlines set out in point 3.
- b. **Wait for the outcome** of the eligibility check. **If you do not meet the entry requirements**, you may acquire the missing credits by passing single examinations. The procedures and costs are set out in the section 'Single Examinations' of the Regulations for Attendance at Bachelor's and Master's Degree Programmes and for Student Fees

- c. **Carry out the personal skills assessment** in accordance with the procedures set out in point 4.
- d. **Proceed with enrolment** by paying the course enrolment fees in accordance with the procedures and deadlines set out in point 5.
Enrolment can only take place once the Student Affairs Office has sent an email confirming the successful outcome of the eligibility and personal knowledge checks.

For students coming from other Italian universities

Students coming from other Italian universities must, after paying €10.00, submit a self-declaration stating the exams they have taken, the scientific-disciplinary sectors corresponding to the courses, and the relevant syllabuses, using the form "Dichiarazione laurea ed esami per verifica dei requisiti" available on the University website, on the student forms page

The declaration must be submitted in one of the following ways:

- from the email address provided on Infostud at the time of registration, to the email address of your Student Affairs Office or to the address specified in the curriculum requirements, available in the degree programme catalogue on the page for each programme under the 'Enrolment' section. Before submitting your application, you

must check that you have uploaded your identity document to Infostud, under 'Profile > Personal Documents';

For students who have not yet obtained their degree

Where the course regulations so provide, students who have not yet obtained their degree (at Sapienza or at other universities) may also apply for verification of their eligibility, subject to the requirement to obtain it by 23 January 2027 (for students who have not yet obtained their degree at Sapienza) and by 19 December 2026 (for students who have not yet obtained their degree from other Italian or international universities).

For students from abroad and/or holding a qualification obtained within a foreign education system

The procedures for students from abroad are set out in point 6.

2. Admission requirements

To be admitted, applicants must successfully pass an assessment of their academic qualifications and personal knowledge according to the criteria set out below.

The academic requirements relate to the minimum knowledge and skills pertaining to the fundamentals of mechanical industrial engineering, acquired through a degree, an equivalent qualification or through subsequent certified university-level study. These skills and knowledge are deemed to have been acquired if the applicant has earned no fewer than 54 university credits (CFU) relating to the subject areas of the scientific disciplinary sectors (SSD) of the core subjects (mathematics, physics and chemistry) and no fewer than 66 CFU relating to the subject areas of the scientific disciplinary sectors of subjects belonging to the industrial engineering class (degree class L-9), with particular reference to mechanical engineering. In more detail:

a) Requirements in core subjects. No fewer than 54 CFU in courses in the fields of mathematics, physics and chemistry, of which at least 27 CFU must be in at least 3 courses relating to: mathematical analysis, geometry, experimental physics and mathematical physics. The following SSDs are to be considered as the reference areas for this assessment: CHIM/07 Chemical Foundations of Technology, ING-INF/05 Computer Science, MAT/03 Geometry, MAT/05 Mathematical Analysis, MAT/06 Probability and Mathematical Statistics, MAT/07 Mathematical Physics, MAT/08 Numerical Analysis, MAT/09 Operational Research, FIS/01 Experimental Physics.

b) Requirements in subjects within the field of industrial engineering and mechanical engineering. No fewer than 18 CFU in at least 3 courses relating to knowledge in the areas of fluid mechanics, electrical engineering and electrical machinery, metallurgy and materials science. The following scientific disciplines (SSD) are to be considered as reference areas for this assessment: ING-IND/31 Electrical Engineering, ING-IND/06 Fluid Dynamics, ING-IND/21 Metallurgy, ING-IND/32 Electrical Converters, Machines and Drives, ING-IND/22 Materials Science.

No fewer than 48 CFU in at least 4 modules relating to core knowledge in the three areas of mechanical engineering training, where the following SSDs are to be considered as reference areas for this assessment:

Design area: ICAR/08 Structural Engineering, ING-IND/13 Mechanics Applied to Machinery, ING-IND/14 Mechanical Design and Machine Construction, ING-IND/15 Drawing and Methods of Industrial Engineering; ING-IND/12 Mechanical and Thermal Measurements.

Energy Systems and Energy Conversion: ING-IND/08 Fluid Machinery; ING-IND/09 Energy and Environmental Systems; ING-IND/10 Industrial Technical Physics; ING-IND/10 Industrial Technical Physics.

Mechanical Technology and Industrial Plant Area: ING-IND/16 Manufacturing Technologies and Systems; ING-IND/17 Mechanical Industrial Plant.

The assessment of academic requirements is carried out by the Mechanical Engineering Area Educational Board (CADIME), which examines the qualifications held, verifying both the SSDs corresponding to the courses undertaken and, where necessary (e.g. in the case of a qualification obtained at another university or a qualification in other fields or degree categories), by analysing the syllabuses of the relevant courses. Where academic requirements are not met, the CADIME will provide practical guidance on how to fulfil the minimum admission requirements, including through one or more courses to be taken as 'single examinations' in order to meet the academic requirements.

When determining the number of individual courses required to meet the curriculum requirements, CADIME will also take into account the degree average, as an indicator of the applicant's ability to independently fulfil academic requirements in specific subject areas. In this regard, two ranges of degree average (weighted by ECTS credits) have been identified: 27.00/30 or above (up to a maximum of two subject areas); 24.00/30 or above but less than 27.00/30 (up to a maximum of one subject area).

In the case of a degree obtained at another university or in engineering disciplines other than Mechanical Engineering, it is possible to request a preliminary assessment from CADIME via Google Form.

With regard to dual-degree programmes with foreign universities, in addition to the criteria set out for the academic and personal knowledge requirements described here – which apply to the Italian degree programme – further specific criteria relating to attendance on the course at the foreign university may apply, as indicated in the relevant bilateral agreements available on the CADIME website, in the 'Dual Degree' section.

In particular, for dual degrees with universities in the United States of America, applicants must have obtained their degree with a mark of 101 or above and demonstrate a good knowledge of the English language, certified by TOEFL or GRE tests.

With regard to the Mechanical Engineering Design programme, delivered entirely in English, students of foreign nationality will only be admitted following a preliminary selection process in accordance with the relevant call for applications, defined annually based on the requirements of the programme's Academic Regulations (<https://www.uniroma1.it/en/pagina/study-sapienza>). The minimum admission threshold for the final degree mark is a mark equivalent to 24.00/30.

3. Verification of eligibility

Eligibility checks must be requested by paying a €10.00 fee from 2 July 2026 and by one of the following dates, as chosen:

- 15 September 2026 (the only applicable date for applicants from non-EU countries requiring a student visa)
- 15 October 2026
- 17 November 2026
- 17 December 2026
- 14 January 2027 (date reserved for students who have already graduated from Sapienza or are about to graduate).

The payment is generated via the Infostud system.

The **payment** is made online via PagoPA (direct payment).

The **code** to be entered into the system is **33494**.

The result of the eligibility check will be sent to your institutional email account (if active) or to the personal email address provided on Infostud.

4. Assessment of personal knowledge

In addition to the assessment of academic requirements, for the purposes of admission to the Master's degree programme in Mechanical Engineering, applicants must also meet the personal knowledge requirements. The personal knowledge requirements are designed to ascertain the adequacy of the knowledge acquired in the relevant academic subjects. The

assessment of personal knowledge is based on the degree mark, i.e. the weighted average calculated on the basis of ECTS credits. If the degree mark is less than 90.00/110, or if the weighted average calculated on the basis of ECTS credits is less than 22.00/30, enrolment is subject to a test to assess personal knowledge, as follows:

- a) Passing the personal knowledge test, which is conducted on the basis of a syllabus and in accordance with the procedures described on the dedicated page on the CADIME website.
- b) If, during the assessment of curricular requirements, at least two single courses have been awarded – personal knowledge may be deemed to have been demonstrated by achieving an average mark of 24.00/30 or higher in those courses.

Knowledge of English at a minimum B2 level is required for degree programmes taught in English. In this regard, the following are recognised as contributing to this requirement: English language activities at B2 level undertaken as part of the first-cycle degree programme; a certification from among those recognised by the degree programme; or by successfully completing the advanced language courses offered by the Faculty (<https://ici.web.uniroma1.it/en>).

5. Enrolment

Enrolment is granted upon payment of the course enrolment fees, following the successful completion of the assessment of entry requirements and personal knowledge.

The payment slip is generated via the Infostud system.

Payment is made online via PagoPA (direct payment).

The **code** to be entered into the system is **33494**.

6. For students who hold a qualification from a foreign education system

The procedures vary depending on citizenship and country of residence.

For citizens of non-EU countries who reside abroad and are applying for a student visa, and for students from China participating in the Marco Polo programme who have chosen the English-language programme

In these cases, you must hold a mandatory letter of pre-acceptance.

For citizens of non-EU countries who reside abroad and are applying for a student visa, and for students from China participating in the Marco Polo project who have chosen the Italian-language programme

In this case, a letter of pre-acceptance is not required, but you must **pass the Italian language proficiency test** (level B2), or submit a certificate of proficiency in Italian at a level no lower than B2, as indicated in point 1 on the International Students' Office page. This requirement applies only to those applying for enrolment on a degree programme taught in Italian

For students who are Italian citizens, citizens of EU countries (regardless of their country of residence) and citizens of non-EU countries holding a residence permit in Italy
